

# PRE-CONSTRUCTION SOCIAL IMPACT MANAGEMENT REPORT

New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project

Eleventh report - December 2020 - REVo

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

This report has been prepared in accordance with the Queensland Coordinator-General's Conditions for New Acland Coal Pty Ltd (NAC) Stage 3's approval, to meet **Condition 17**: **Social Impact Management Report (SIMR): pre-construction.** 

#### **Condition 17** requires:

"(a) Commencing from the date of this Coordinator-General's Evaluation Report and up to the date of commencement of construction, every six months the proponent is to provide the SIMR to the Coordinator-General. The reports are to be made publicly available by the proponent.

#### (b) The SIMR is to contain:

- "(i) the actions taken to inform the community about project impacts and show that community concerns about project impacts have been taken into account
- (ii) the actions, outcomes and adaptive management strategies to avoid, manage or mitigate project-related impacts on community health, safety and social infrastructure".

This SIMR covers the period from 1 June 2020 to 30 November 2020 and is the eleventh preconstruction SIMR to be prepared for the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project (NACo3 or the Project). It provides an update on the Project's recent community and stakeholder engagement activities and associated outcomes, and outlines the progress of the Project's community health, safety and social infrastructure management strategies.

Once the SIMR is received by the Coordinator-General and receipt is acknowledged, this SIMR will be published and remain available online at <a href="https://www.aclandproject.com.au/content/reporting">www.aclandproject.com.au/content/reporting</a>.

#### 1.1. COVID-19

Easing of COVID-19 restrictions from June 2020 has allowed New Hope Group to increase face to face engagement with the New Acland Mine community. New Hope Group has provided high quality support to members of the community throughout this reporting period including attending multiple COVID safe events within the New Acland community, in strict accordance with Queensland Government health advice and New Hope Group health and safety guidelines.

#### 1.2. The Project

The Project is located approximately 160km west of Brisbane, 35km north-west of Toowoomba, and 14km north-west of the town of Oakey. The Project involves the expansion of the existing open-cut New Acland Coal Mine to increase production and to extend the life of the mine.

The Evaluation Report for the Project's Environmental Impact Statement was provided by the Office of the Coordinator-General on 19 December 2014 and included 137 conditions for the Project's development and operation.

On 18 January 2017, the Project was granted Federal Government approval under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act* 1999 (Cth).

The Project also requires mining leases to be approved under the *Mineral Resources Act* 1989 (Qld), and an associated water licence (AWL) to be granted under the *Water Act* 2000 (Qld).

On 30 May 2018, New Acland Coal Pty Ltd was advised by the Oakey Coal Action Alliance Inc. that it had lodged a notice of appeal in respect of the Supreme Court of Queensland decision that set aside the Queensland Land Court's recommendation regarding the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 mining lease applications and related environmental authority amendment.

Following a three-year period of court and judicial review processes associated with the Project, on 8 November 2018, the Queensland Land Court recommended that the Project's mining leases and EA amendment be granted provided certain conditions are met, including that the Coordinator-General amend the Project's noise limits within the 'stated conditions' of the Project's 2014 EIS Evaluation Report.

The Supreme Court of Queensland, Court of Appeal hearing took place 27 February 2019 to 1 March 2019. This was an appeal against the Supreme Court of Queensland's judicial review of the Queensland Land Court's recommendation regarding the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 mining lease applications and related environmental authority amendment.

On 12 March 2019, the Company was advised by the Queensland Department of Environment and Science that they had granted the application to amend the Environmental Authority (EA), pursuant to the *Environmental Protection Act 1994 (Qld)* for the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project.

The amended EA includes a significant number of stringent environmental conditions and was granted following the Coordinator-General approving amendments to the noise conditions, thereby satisfying all preconditions set by the Land Court.

The AWL public notification period for submissions concluded 7 May 2019. The grant of the AWL by the Department of Resources is still outstanding.

On 24 May 2019, a request to change a condition concerning Coordinator-General imposed Condition 4(a), Jondaryan train load-out facility, was lodged with the Coordinator-General. The public submission period opened 22 June 2019 and closed 21 July 2019. This change request was granted by the Coordinator-General on 18 September 2020.

The Supreme Court of Queensland, Court of Appeal handed downs its Reasons on 10 September 2019 and Orders on 1 November 2019 refusing the appeal and allowing the cross-appeal from New Acland Coal Pty Ltd.

On 29 November 2019 the Oakey Coal Action Alliance applied for special leave to appeal the Supreme Court of Queensland, Court of Appeal decision to the High Court. The application was heard on 5 June 2020 and special leave granted to Oakey Coal Action Alliance.

On 6 October 2020, the High Court heard the Oakey Coal Action Alliance's appeal. A decision from the High Court is pending and is not expected until early 2021. The Regional Impact Development Approval (RIDA) public notification period for the Project commenced 11 December 2019 and closed 17 January 2020. NAC's RIDA for the Project was granted by the Department of State Development, Tourism and Innovation on 25 August 2020.

The Project's mining leases and AWL are the only primary approvals still requiring grant.

The New Hope Group remains committed to delivering the Project and will continue to actively work with the relevant government departments to progress its approval.

Further information regarding the Project's court and judicial review processes has been reported in earlier editions of the Social Impact Management Report (available at <a href="http://www.aclandproject.com.au/content/reporting">http://www.aclandproject.com.au/content/reporting</a>). A chronology of the Project's assessment and approval process is also tabled as Annexure A to this report.

#### 2. COMMUNITY AND STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

The New Hope Group maintains a regular program of communication and engagement with local landholders, communities and stakeholders to understand and respond to particular areas of interest or concern regarding the Project. Prolonged uncertainty regarding the Project's statutory approvals has affected some aspects of community engagement and assistance programs.

#### 2.1. Outcomes of Engagement

The following sections report on the outcomes of the Project's engagement activities for the period of 1 June 2020 to 30 November 2020.

#### 2.1.1. Landholder engagement

Key outcomes from the Project's engagement with landholders in the last six months are as follows.

#### June 2020

- Sentiment among landholders has improved, with favourable rainfall received over the month of June and cattle prices increasing. Caution is being displayed by landholders who export cattle; however, they have so far been able to continue their operations amidst the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Landholders contributed to a series of awareness videos coordinated by New Hope Senior Digital Media Advisor for use on social media in support of the NACo3 campaign. Six landholders who have not previously participated in campaigns agreed to be a part of the videos, that were run over a period of three months in a targeted campaign. Five community groups also participated in the videos.

#### July 2020

- Landholder visits were conducted this month during which landholders were provided with an update in regard to the current operations and the continued delay in the approvals of New Acland Coal Stage 3. Consulted landholders expressed frustration at the continuing delays.
- The Landholder Liaison position was made redundant in the month of July, largely due to the delays in the approval of NACo3. Landholders were notified and expressed disappointment but understanding of the decision.
- There has been some good rainfall in the area surrounding Acland. Local farmers are feeling more confident with existing crops tracking well. Some landholders however are still handfeeding stock with little to no rain in their area.

#### August 2020

- Landholder engagement continued through August by phone, email and face to face meetings. The majority of landholders who engaged with New Hope sought updates on the New Acland Mine Stage 3 approvals process.
- A number of Landholders participated in the NACo3 awareness videos used in social media.
- Rain in the region continues to be patchy however most neighbours are experiencing much improved conditions. Cattle prices are currently high which has renewed some confidence in the season.

#### September 2020

- General landholder meetings were conducted providing updates on reductions in operations and the New Acland Stage 3 approvals process.
- Despite good rainfall last month, the region continues to experience extremely dry conditions with little to no rainfall occurring during September. Local landholders are becoming concerned even though the outlook is for wetter than normal conditions.

#### October 2020

- Most landholders were busy with harvesting during October which were their first winter crops for several years.
- A significant Company restructure resulted in the position of Senior Landholder and Community Coordinator being made redundant this month, due in substantial part to the continuing delays in the approval of NACo<sub>3</sub>.
- Landholder engagement via phone, e-mail and face to face meetings occurred this month to provide an update regarding the Company restructure and employee redundancies. Landholders consulted were provided with contact details of the Community Liaison who will now be the primary contact for our landholders.

#### November 2020

- The Senior Landholder and Community Coordinator finished with the business this month.
- Handover was coordinated between the Senior Landholder and Community Coordinator and the Community Liaison in November.
- Contacted landholders were provided with an update on the company restructure and New Acland Mine Stage 3 approvals process.
- Several of our Landholders attended a face to face update regarding the New Acland Stage 3 approvals process by the New Hope Group Chief Operating Officer.

#### 2.1.2. Community engagement

Key outcomes from the Project's community engagement in the last six months are as follows.

#### June 2020

- New Hope Group's Chief Operating Officer and Senior Digital Media Advisor provided an update to the community following the recent decision by the High Court to approve OCAA's application for special leave. Although capped at a 20-person capacity due to COVID-19 restrictions the event was well attended in person and via video link.
- A meeting was held with Riding for the Disabled Toowoomba at their Cranley property to discuss New Hope's capacity to assist with replacing an existing damaged fence. New Hope will assist by providing equipment and labour to replace the fence by the end of 2020.
- Several landholders and members of the community joined the New Acland Community Information team at a press conference in support of New Hope Group and the approval of New Acland Stage 3 during the month of June.

#### July 2020

• AMMA (formerly Australian Mines and Metal Association) STEM programs were delivered to students at Toowoomba North State School and Harlaxton State School in July. Representatives from New Acland Mine and the New Acland Community

- Information Centre attended the programs. NAC General Manager, Dave O'Dwyer, delivered a presentation to the students which received great feedback from students and teachers.
- Planning for Lifeflight and New Hope Group partnership initiatives have recommenced. COVID-19 has caused significant delay in delivering the Rural First Aid program to the community.
- Significant work has been completed on the NHG Regional Signage project which comprises tourism signage being designed and installed in multiple communities surrounding New Acland operations. This project is expected to be finalised late 2020.

#### August 2020

- Jondaryan drop-in sessions recommenced in August following the lifting of Covid-19 restrictions. No members of the public attended this month.
- Staff from New Acland Mine and Community Information Centre attended multiple STEM and career preparation events at Oakey State High School this month. NAC Technical Services Manager shared career & study pathway opportunities with year 10 students as part of the QMEA STEM program. The program received great feedback from students and the broader school community.
- New Acland Mine's General Manager presented four cheques to Community Investment Fund (CIF) recipients from the March round of CIF. The fund supported projects in Highfields, Oakey, Gowrie Junction and Jondaryan.
- Toowoomba Regional Council (TRC) Councillors participated in a tour of New Acland
  Mine and a short presentation in August. Eight of the eleven TRC Councillors attended,
  including the TRC Mayor. An additional tour of the Wetalla water infrastructure and Coal
  Handing & Preparation Plant was given to the Councillors responsible for regional water
  and waste portfolios.

#### September 2020

- Topics raised by the community during Community Information Centre visits remained consistent with New Acland Mine community seeking information on the NACo3 approval process, current media campaign and State Government Elections in October.
- COVID-19 continues to impact community meetings/events. The easing of some restrictions has provided a chance to engage in more face to face meetings in the community.
- The New Acland Mine community continue to make enquiries regarding the New Hope Group sponsorship & donation program. New Acland Community Information Centre Team are advising community that all programs are currently suspended due to budget constraints. New Hope will continue to seek ways to support community groups in an inkind capacity.

#### October 2020

- The New Acland Community Information Centre Team along with employees of New Acland Mine attended two QMEA Beakers.Bots.Build programs at Oakey State High School and Toowoomba State High School this month. Students were positively engaged and provided good feedback from each event.
- Jondaryan Drop-in session was held this month with no attendance by the public.
- New Acland Community Information Centre Team along with New Acland Employees and New Hope Corporate employees attended a community-led rally in support of New Acland Mine Stage 3 this month. Over 300 members of the community attended with good attendance also from Local, State and Federal Government.

#### November 2020

- New Hope Group hosted a community update, which attracted around 30 members of the community and landholders. Chief Operating Officer provided an update to the community regarding the New Acland Stage 3 approvals process and the recent Company restructure.
- New Hope Group is preparing to attend multiple community meetings and events in November and December as restrictions continue to ease.
- While the New Hope Group sponsorship and donations program continues to be suspended, New Hope Group staff continue to support the community with in-kind volunteer work and donations.

#### 2.1.3. Key stakeholder engagement

- New Hope Group met with a State Labour MP via teleconference to provide a NACo3 Project briefing.

- Members of the New Acland Community Information Centre met with the Oakey Chamber of Commerce to provide an update on NACo3 approval.

#### July 2020

- New Hope Group met with a Queensland Senator to provide a briefing on NACo3 Project.
- New Hope Group provided an update on the NACo3 Project via phone to a Federal LNP MP.
- A member of the New Acland Community Information Centre provided an update on the NACo3 Project to Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce Members.

#### August 2020

- New Hope Group met with a State LNP MP to discuss the NACo3 Project.
- New Hope Group met with a Federal Labour MP to provide an update on the NACo3 Project.
- A member of the New Acland Community Information Centre met with the Oakey Chamber of Commerce to provide an update on the NACo3 Project.

#### September 2020

- New Hope Group met with the State Leader of the Opposition to provide a brief on the NACo3 Project.
- A member of New Acland Community Information Centre provided an update on the NACo<sub>3</sub> Project to Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce

#### October 2020

- New Hope Group met with Townsville Chamber of Commerce to provide a briefing on the NACo3 Project
- New Hope Group provided and update on the NACo3 Project to State Labour MP in Rockhampton.

- New Hope Group met with the Rockhampton Regional Council Mayor to provide a briefing on NACo3 Project.
- New Hope Group met with the Toowoomba Surat Basin Enterprise to provide an update on the NACo3 Project approval.
- New Hope Group met with a Toowoomba Regional Council Councillor to provide an update on the NACo3 Project approval.
- New Hope Group provided an update on the NACo3 Project approval to a State LNP MP.

#### November 2020

 Member of New Acland Community Information Centre provided an update on the NACo<sub>3</sub> Project approvals to the Oakey Chamber of Commerce

#### 2.2. Complaints Management

There were no complaints received in relation to the NACo3 Project between 1 June 2020 and 30 November 2020.

#### 2.3. Consultation Stakeholders and Issues Report





The top ten topics addressed during engagement with the general community and with members of community groups in the last six months are presented in Figure 1. It shows engagement in the reporting period has largely focused on, communication and engagement, approvals process, government process, community partnerships and sponsorship, community health and wellbeing, groundwater and pastoral activities.

The Project's landholder engagement program during the reporting period has involved 44 events with 28 distinct landholder stakeholders: 3 Tier 1 landholders, 13 Tier 2 landholders, and 1 Tier 3 landholders. Tier 3 landholders are located outside the immediate Project area. As shown in Figure 2, the Project's communication and engagement, pastoral activities, community health and wellbeing, approvals process and noise were the primary topics discussed during landholder engagement.





The Project's engagement with other key stakeholders over the reporting period included meetings and correspondence with community groups and charities, educational stakeholders, community reference group and registered businesses (refer Table 1).

Key outcomes of engagement with these stakeholders are as summarised in Section 2.1.3. Details of engagement by stakeholder group are summarised in Section 2.4.

#### 2.4. Q3-Q4 Communication and Engagement Activities

The following tables summarise the Project's activities against key commitments to community and stakeholder engagement for the reporting period.

The Project's engagement mechanisms include tailored strategies for landholders in three categories:

- Tier 1: High Priority Landholders –those who are potentially impacted as shown through environmental modelling;
- Tier 2: Landholders near the mine with less potential for impacts; and
- Tier 3: Other landholders in the Jondaryan and Oakey communities.

### 3. COMMUNITY HEALTH, SAFETY AND SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE

#### 3.1. Community Health, Safety and Wellbeing

As reported in June 2016, the Project has initiated a substantial proportion of the commitments detailed in its Social Impact Management Action Plan for Health and Community Wellbeing, as well as additional commitments made in relation to community health and wellbeing in Chapter 5 of the AEIS. The outcomes of engagement with relevant stakeholders are reported in Sections 2.1.3 and 2.4 of this SIMR.

The New Hope Group's community investment and sponsorship programs related to social infrastructure are summarised in Section 3.2.

#### 3.2. Social Infrastructure

The New Acland CIF assists not-for-profit community groups and organisations to develop long-term projects and initiatives for the benefit of communities around the New Acland Coal Mine. Not-for-profit community groups and organisations within the Toowoomba region are eligible to apply for grants under the New Acland Mine CIF.

The New Acland Mine CIF was launched in August 2013 and is in addition to the New Hope Group's Community Donations and Sponsorship Program.

The New Hope Group, in consultation with the New Acland Community Reference Group (CRG), having partnered with the University of Southern Queensland's (USQ) Institute for Resilient Regions, has implemented six community development projects aligned to community priorities identified by USQ research. These projects were funded through allocations from the Community Investment Fund, in agreement with the Community Reference Group.

Since 1 June 2020, the New Hope Group has directly supported 17 organisations in the Toowoomba region, to a value of approximately \$74,871. Funding support was also provided to a number of local community organisations toward regular community events and targeted initiatives in Oakey, Goombungee, Jondaryan, and in Toowoomba.

#### 3.3. Acland Management Plan

The Acland Management Plan (AMP) sets out the Project's arrangements and commitments for the management and maintenance of the Acland Township. This includes ongoing conservation management of specific local heritage items and structures identified by the AMP and Acland Colliery Conservation Management Plan, and general grounds maintenance in Acland.

The Colliery has also been fully laser scanned to record the structure, and New Hope Group continues to implement control measures for borer and termites through a third-party contractor.

#### 4. PROJECT PLAN
