

# PRE-CONSTRUCTION SOCIAL IMPACT MANAGEMENT REPORT

New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project

Fourteenth report – June 2022 – REVo

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

This report has been prepared in accordance with the Queensland Coordinator-General's Imposed Conditions for New Acland Coal Pty Ltd (NAC) Stage 3's approval, to meet Condition 17: Social Impact Management Report (SIMR): pre-construction.

#### **Condition 17** requires:

"(a) Commencing from the date of the Coordinator-General's Evaluation Report and up to the date of commencement of construction, every six months the proponent is to provide the SIMR to the Coordinator-General. The reports are to be made publicly available by the proponent.

#### (b) The SIMR is to contain:

"(i) the actions taken to inform the community about project impacts and show that community concerns about project impacts have been taken into account

(ii) the actions, outcomes and adaptive management strategies to avoid, manage or mitigate project-related impacts on community health, safety and social infrastructure".

This SIMR covers the period from 1 December 2021 to 31 May 2022 and is the fourteenth pre-construction SIMR to be prepared for the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project (NACo3 or the Project). It provides an update on the Project's recent community and stakeholder engagement activities and associated outcomes, and outlines the progress of the Project's community health, safety and social infrastructure management strategies.

Once the SIMR is received by the Coordinator-General and receipt is acknowledged, this SIMR will be published and remain available online at <a href="https://newhopegroup.com.au/general-reporting/">https://newhopegroup.com.au/general-reporting/</a>.

#### 1.1. The Project

The Project is located approximately 160km west of Brisbane, 35km north-west of Toowoomba, and 14km north-west of the town of Oakey. The Project involves the expansion of the existing open-cut New Acland Coal Mine to increase production and to extend the life of the mine.

The Evaluation Report for the Project's Environmental Impact Statement was provided by the Office of the Coordinator-General on 19 December 2014 and included 137 conditions for the Project's development and operation.

On 18 January 2017, the Project was granted Federal Government approval under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act* 1999 (Cth).

The Project also requires mining leases to be approved under the *Mineral Resources Act* 1989 (Qld), and an associated water licence (AWL) to be granted under the *Water Act* 2000 (Qld).

On 30 May 2018, New Acland Coal Pty Ltd was advised by the Oakey Coal Action Alliance Inc. that it had lodged a notice of appeal in respect of the Supreme Court of Queensland decision that set aside the Queensland Land Court's recommendation regarding the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 mining lease applications and related environmental authority amendment.

Following a three-year period of court and judicial review processes associated with the Project, on 8 November 2018, the Queensland Land Court recommended that the Project's mining leases and EA amendment be granted provided certain conditions are met, including that the Coordinator-General amend the Project's noise limits within the 'stated conditions' of the Project's 2014 EIS Evaluation Report.

The Supreme Court of Queensland, Court of Appeal hearing took place 27 February 2019 to 1 March 2019. This was an appeal against the Supreme Court of Queensland's judicial review of the Queensland Land Court's recommendation regarding the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 mining lease applications and related environmental authority amendment.

On 12 March 2019, the Company was advised by the Queensland Department of Environment and Science that they had granted the application to amend the Environmental Authority (EA), pursuant to the *Environmental Protection Act 1994 (Qld)* for the New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project. This EA has now been set aside.

The AWL public notification period for submissions concluded 7 May 2019. The grant of the AWL by the Department of Regional Development, Manufacturing and Water is still outstanding.

On 24 May 2019, a request to change a condition concerning Coordinator-General imposed Condition 4(a), Jondaryan train load-out facility, was lodged with the Coordinator-General. The public submission period opened 22 June 2019 and closed 21 July 2019. This change request was granted by the Coordinator-General on 18 September 2020.

The Supreme Court of Queensland, Court of Appeal handed downs its Reasons on 10 September 2019 and Orders on 1 November 2019 refusing the appeal and allowing the cross-appeal from New Acland Coal Pty Ltd.

On 29 November 2019, the Oakey Coal Action Alliance applied for special leave to appeal the Supreme Court of Queensland, Court of Appeal decision to the High Court. The application was heard on 5 June 2020 and special leave granted to Oakey Coal Action Alliance.

On 6 October 2020, the High Court heard the Oakey Coal Action Alliance's appeal.

The Regional Impact Development Approval (RIDA) public notification period for the Project commenced 11 December 2019 and closed 17 January 2020. NAC's RIDA for the Project was granted by the Department of State Development, Tourism and Innovation on 25 August 2020.

On 3 February 2021, the High Court handed down its decision that New Acland Coal's mining lease applications and environmental authority amendment application be remitted to the

Queensland Land Court for reconsideration. As above, the EA granted on 12 March 2019 has now been set aside.

The Land Court remittal hearing was heard between 26 October 2021 and 25 November 2021 in Toowoomba and Brisbane.

On 17 December 2021 the Land Court of Queensland recommended that the New Acland Mine Stage 3 mining leases and the environmental authority amendment application be granted, subject to conditions. In accordance with that decision, NAC applied to the Coordinator-General to amend stated conditions.

On 26 May 2022, the Coordinator-General issued her change report which approved changes to certain stated conditions relevant to the Environmental Authority for the New Acland Mine Stage 3 Project.

The New Hope Group remains committed to delivering the Project and will continue to actively work with the relevant government departments to progress its approval.

A chronology of the Project's assessment and approval process is also tabled as Annexure A to this report.

#### 2. COMMUNITY AND STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

The New Hope Group maintains a regular program of communication and engagement with local landholders, communities and stakeholders to understand and respond to particular areas of interest or concern regarding the Project. Prolonged uncertainty regarding the Project's statutory approvals has affected some aspects of community engagement and assistance programs.

#### 2.1. Outcomes of Engagement

The following sections report on the outcomes of the Project's engagement activities for the period of 1 December 2021 to 31 May 2022.

#### 2.1.1. Landholder engagement

Key outcomes from the Project's engagement with landholders in the last six months are as follows.

#### December 2021

- Landholders expressed interest in the recent Queensland Land Court recommendation with engagement mainly focusing on the NACo3 approvals process this month.
- One face to face meeting with a landholder occurred during December. Three face-to-face landholder meetings were postponed to early 2022 due to an increase in COVID-19 cases in the region.

#### January 2022

- Face to face meetings occurred with two landholders this month regarding property access for the purpose of environmental monitoring and NACo3 approvals update.
- COVID-19 cases continue to rise in the region, with many landholders opting for phone
  updates rather than face to face meetings.

#### February 2022

- Heavy rainfall across the district has caused significant flooding in areas surrounding New Acland Mine operations during February.
- Many landholders have experienced large wash outs in cultivated paddocks due to recent rainfall.
- The NAC Environmental Team, Community & Landholder Advisor and Acland Pastoral Company have planned for 2022 pest management in consultation with local landholders and local pest management experts.

#### March 2022

- NAC Environmental Team and Community & Landholder Advisor attended a Pest & Weed Management Information Session hosted by North East Downs Landcare Group during March. The session was well attended by local landholders and members of the public.
- New Acland Mine and Acland Pastoral Company participated in a Local Government Pest Management Program, for the control of feral dogs and foxes during March.
   Notifications were sent to 15 landholders advising of the intention to complete the Pest Management Program.

 Acland Pastoral Company and NAC Community & Landholder Advisor engaged with local landholders and Rural Fire Service of Jondaryan to discuss conducting a controlled burn on APC land to provide a firebreak to neighbouring properties before fire season.

#### April 2022

- NAC Community & Landholder Advisor attended face-to-face meetings with four landholders during April as part of planning for Feral Pig Management on NAC and Acland Pastoral Company land. These meetings also provided any opportunity to provide a NACo3 update.
- Feedback received at these landholder meetings has been used to formulate a plan to control rising feral pig numbers in the immediate area surrounding New Acland Coal Mine.

#### May 2022

- Notifications were delivered to 30 landholders during May, advising of NAC and Acland Pastoral Company's intention to engage a certified aerial work operator to complete an aerial cull for the control of feral pigs on areas of New Acland Coal Mine and Acland Pastoral Company Land.
- The aerial cull, for the control of feral pigs was conducted on 20 May 2022 with excellent success. Discussions with landholders after the aerial cull were very positive, with plans in place to conduct further feral pig control activities over the next 6 months.

#### 2.1.2. Community engagement

Key outcomes from the Project's community engagement in the last six months are as follows.

#### December 2021

- New Acland Community and Landholder Advisor attended the Oakey Men's Shed Christmas breakup during December.
- NAC Community and Landholder Advisor attended the Oakey Chamber of Commerce inaugural Community Volunteers Celebration this month. The event was well attended by local community organisations and local business owners.

#### January 2022

- Work from home arrangements were implemented for New Acland Mine office employees during January due to the increasing number of COVID-19 cases in the region.
- Engagement with community members and organisations continued, mostly via email and phone.

#### February 2022

- Flooding continued to be a concern for the local community, with many people experiencing restricted access to work and minor damage to local businesses.
- New Acland Mine Community and Landholder Advisor met with the new Manager of Jondaryan Woolshed to discuss future partnership opportunities.

#### March 2022

- NAC Community and Landholder Advisor, NAC Environmental Advisor and APC Team
  Lead met with the Northeast Downs Landcare Group President and a local conservation
  expert to discuss strategies to support the preservation of habitat for a rare bird of
  Jondaryan, the Painted Honeyeater.
- New Acland Coal Mine donated the use of a portable lighting tower to a local primary school for their use at a school social function.
- New Acland Coal published a New Acland Community Newsletter, including a NACo3 update in March.
- New Hope Group sponsored the purchase of 10 feral pig baiting stations for the North East Downs Landcare Group. These stations will be lent to landholders close to New Acland Mine for the control of feral pigs.

#### April 2022

- New Acland Mine Community and Landholder Advisor provided an update to Oakey Chamber of Commerce members at their monthly meeting.
- New Acland Mine hosted three private tours during April.

#### May 2022

- New Acland Community and Landholder Advisor was invited to attend a 'Biggest Morning Tea' fundraiser at an Oakey business in May.
- New Acland Community and Landholder Advisor provided an update to the New Acland Community Reference Group on NACo3 approvals process via email.

#### 2.1.3. Key stakeholder engagement

Recent outcomes from the Project's engagement with key stakeholders are as follows.

#### December 2021

- New Acland Coal Mine representatives met with members of the Oakey Chamber of Commerce to provide an update on the NACo3 approval process.
- New Acland Coal Mine Community and Landholder Advisor met with six business owners in Oakey to provide a NACo3 update.

#### January 2022

- New Acland Coal Community and Landholder Advisor provided a Company update to a Federal MP via phone in January.
- New Acland Coal Community and Landholder Advisor provided a Company update to the New Acland Coal Community Reference Group via email.

#### February 2022

- New Acland Coal Community and Landholder Advisor provided a NACo3 update to a Regional Economic Development Officer from the Toowoomba Regional Council.
- New Acland Coal provided a Company update to the NAC Community Reference Group via email.

#### March 2022

• New Acland Coal Community and Landholder Advisor met with members of the Oakey Chamber of Commerce to provide a NACo3 update.

#### April 2022

- New Acland Mine General Manager and New Acland Coal Community and Landholder Advisor provided an update on the NACo3 approvals process to a Federal MP.
- New Acland Mine General Manager hosted a tour of New Acland Mine and provided an update on the NACo3 approvals process to a federal election candidate during April.

#### May 2022

- New Acland Coal Community and Landholder Advisor provided a Project update to the Member for Condamine via phone.
- New Acland Coal liaised with NAC Community Reference Group members to plan for a June 2022 CRG meeting.
- New Acland Coal Community and Landholder Advisor provided a NACo3 approvals process update to NAC Community Reference Group via email.

#### 2.2. Complaints Management

There were no complaints received in relation to the NACo3 Project between 1 December 2021 and 31 May 2022

#### 2.3. Consultation Stakeholders and Issues Report


Over the past six months, the New Hope Group has been involved in 175 interactions with local community and stakeholders (e.g., email correspondence, phone calls and meetings) related to the Project, and has engaged with a total of 93 individuals. Table 1 presents a breakdown of these interactions by stakeholder group.

The top ten topics addressed during engagement with the general community and with members of community groups in the last six months are presented in Figure 1. It shows engagement in the reporting period has largely focused on communication and engagement, community health and wellbeing, pest management, pastoral activities, and the approvals process.

The Project's landholder engagement program during the reporting period has involved 80 events with 69 distinct landholder stakeholders. As shown in Figure 2, pest management, property access, flora and fauna and weed management were the primary topics discussed during landholder engagement.

The Project's engagement with other key stakeholders over the reporting period included meetings and correspondence with community groups and charities, educational stakeholders, community reference group and registered businesses (refer Table 1).

#### 2.4. Q1-Q2 Communication and Engagement Activities

The following tables summarise the Project's activities against key commitments to community and stakeholder engagement for the reporting period.

The Project's engagement mechanisms include tailored strategies for landholders in three categories:

- Tier 1: High Priority Landholders –those who are potentially impacted as shown through environmental modelling;
- Tier 2: Landholders near the mine with less potential for impacts; and
- Tier 3: Other landholders in the Jondaryan and Oakey communities.

### 3. COMMUNITY HEALTH, SAFETY AND SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE

#### 3.1. Community Health, Safety and Wellbeing

As reported in June 2016, the Project has initiated a substantial proportion of the commitments detailed in its Social Impact Management Action Plan for Health and Community Wellbeing, as well as additional commitments made in relation to community health and wellbeing in Chapter 5 of the AEIS. The outcomes of engagement with relevant stakeholders are reported in Sections 2.1.3 and 2.4 of this SIMR.

The New Hope Group's community investment and sponsorship programs related to social infrastructure are summarised in Section 3.2.

#### 3.2. Social Infrastructure

The New Acland CIF assists not-for-profit community groups and organisations to develop long-term projects and initiatives for the benefit of communities around the New Acland Coal Mine. Not-for-profit community groups and organisations within the Toowoomba region are eligible to apply for grants under the New Acland Mine CIF.

The New Acland Mine CIF was launched in August 2013 and is in addition to the New Hope Group's Community Donations and Sponsorship Program.

The New Hope Group, in consultation with the New Acland Community Reference Group (CRG), having partnered with the University of Southern Queensland's (USQ) Institute for Resilient Regions, has implemented six community development projects aligned to community priorities identified by USQ research. These projects were funded through allocations from the Community Investment Fund, in agreement with the Community Reference Group.

Since 1 December 2021, the New Hope Group has supported 4 organisations in the Toowoomba region in an in-kind capacity. Local community organisations have benefited from in-kind donations and personnel support toward regular community events and targeted initiatives in Oakey, Jondaryan and Goombungee.

During the June 2021 reporting period the New Acland Coal Community Investment Fund program was suspended, until such time as NAC03 is approved. New Hope Group and the New Acland Community and Landholder Advisor continue to work with the New Acland Community to identify opportunities to support community events and programs in an inkind capacity.

#### 3.3. Acland Management Plan

The Acland Management Plan (AMP) sets out the Project's arrangements and commitments for the management and maintenance of the Acland Township. This includes ongoing conservation management of specific local heritage items and structures identified by the AMP and Acland Colliery Conservation Management Plan, and general grounds maintenance in Acland.

The Colliery has also been fully laser scanned to record the structure, and New Hope Group continues to implement control measures for borer and termites through a third-party contractor.

#### 4. PROJECT PLAN

This section outlines the Project's plan to deliver on its mitigation and management strategies (Section 4.1) and commitments to community and stakeholder engagement (Section 4.2).
