JONDARYAN RAIL LOADING FACILITY ON THE MOVE

New Hope's rail loading facility will be relocated from the outskirts of Jondaryan onto a new site within the mining lease application for New Acland, if stage three of the project is approved.

The preferred site for the proposed new rail loading facility is more than 8 kilometres northeast of Jondaryan, at the remote southern end of the new mining lease application for New Acland.

New Hope Chief Operating Officer Bruce Denney said the decision to move the facility, which will cost \$62 million, was made after many months of intensive planning and consultation.

"We have listened to the community and other stakeholders on this relocation issue," he said.

Jondaryan District Residents Association Chairman Bruce Arthur welcomed the move.

"This is great news for Jondaryan," he said.
"This decision meets one of our original requests in our submission to the Coordinator General."

The proposed new rail corridor follows a similar route to the current road corridor, travelling next to the Jondaryan-Muldu Road from Jondaryan to a currently preferred site at the southern end of the proposed mining lease.

A new rail line spur would be built from a junction on the main railway line to the preferred site, where a rail loop would be constructed so coal can be loaded directly onto trains.

"If stage three of the New Acland project is approved, under our current timelines with Government, this new rail loading facility could be operating by early 2015," Mr Denney said.

Consultation with residents and the community will continue, and the proposal remains subject to evaluation by the Queensland Coordinator General.

The proposed Stage 3 of the New Acland Coal mine is being assessed through the Oueensland Coordinator General's office. New Hope anticipates it will submit the supplementary **Environmental Impact** Statement (SEIS) in April 2012.

Public comment was received between November 2009 and February 2012, and the draft SEIS was lodged with the office of the Coordinator General in June 2011.

The Queensland Government requested that several areas be addressed in more detail, and these are now being compiled as part of the final SEIS documentation.

Following lodgement of this documentation, the Oueensland Government will issue a copy of the SEIS to all those who commented on the EIS.

Consultation about the project will continue with the public and government agencies.

COMMUNITY **INFORMATION CENTRE TAKES** SHAPE


New Hope is opening its doors to the community with a permanent information centre based in the main street of Oakey.

Scientific cattle grazing trials on rehabilitated land at New Acland have entered an exciting new phase.

The trials are being conducted by the Acland Pastoral Company (APC) in conjunction with the independent Outcross group. The Outcross group also brings additional resources through an association with the University of New England.

This latest phase of the trial will compare the performance of cattle grazing on rehabilitated land with cattle grazing on a paddock of similar pasture in an area not previously mined.

Rehabilitation work has continued right through the summer wet season and the drier months ahead will see the process of shaping of final land form and topsoil spreading accelerate.

The Acland environmental team is now busy working to improve pasture on the areas to be rehabilitated next.

APC also has a new assistant manager starting this month to help with all aspects of the pastoral company's work.

MINING STIMULATES LOCAL ECONOMY



The Darling Downs is emerging as a significant economic beneficiary of the resources sector.

Figures from the Queensland Resources Council show the economic benefits from the mining sector now reach almost every postcode in Queensland.

A 21 percent lift in resource sector spending in the Darling Downs has resulted in the sector already accounting for 10 percent of the region's economy and 7 percent of jobs.

The QRC's update about the sector's contribution to the state for 2010-2011 confirmed the industry spends about \$25 billion throughout the state on local wages, salaries and goods and services each year.

The New Acland mine is one of the region's biggest employers

providing 300 direct jobs and thousands more indirectly. It currently pumps \$80 million into the Darling Downs economy each year.

Stage 3 of the operation would see the number of jobs increase to more than 500 at its peak and the economic benefits to the region would also significantly rise.
