A new display portraying the Oakey region's coal mining history is on show at the New Hope Group's Community Information Centre.

Kath and John Greenhalgh have kindly donated the use of items from the former Acland No.2 underground mine for the information centre on Campbell Street

"The display looks really good. It's nice to see these things out again as we have had them all packed away for a few years now," Mrs Greenhalgh said.

"There are a lot of descendants locally of all the people who worked in the former underground mines at Acland, Balgowan, Willeroo 1, Willeroo 2, Sugarloaf, and also at the former mine here in Oakey, who we hope would be interested in the items on display.

"It's also a reminder of how busy the area once was with mining. The mines once served the railways, brickworks, the gasworks in Toowoomba, hospitals and abattoirs."

Mrs Greenhalgh said the trousers and shirt on the mannequin once belonged to their son who worked at Acland No.2 and the coat and helmet were from other fellow miners in the early 1980s.

The Acland No.2 Colliery, which opened in 1929, was the last underground mine operating in the area when it closed in 1984. The Greenhalghs owned the farm on which the mine was located and they then ran the Acland Mining Museum on site until they retired in 2000.

IMPROVING SAFETY FOR YOUNG DRIVERS

COMMUNITY UPDATE

The New Acland Coal Mine will continue to be self-sufficient for water under the revised New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project.

New Hope's Executive General Manager of Mining Jim Randell said that every drop of water is precious.

"Here at the New Acland Coal Mine, we are self-sufficient in our use and re-use of water throughout the site," he said.

"The only water we use from aquifers is for drinking water and bathroom use. Any other water use on our site - for example in our coal preparation process - is recycled wastewater."

New Hope purchases recycled water from the Toowoomba Regional Council's Wetalla wastewater facility.

In 2009, New Hope built a pumping system and a pipeline from Wetalla to the New Acland mine.

"Because our operations use this wastewater it also saves money for local ratepayers," Mr Randell said.

All rainwater that falls on the New Acland Mine site is captured in dams and used and re-used in mining and farming activities.

"The water used in our coal preparation process is pumped to thickeners and to dams, where the dirt and sediment settles to the bottom and then the water is used again and again in the coal preparation process," Mr Randell said.



The New Hope Group has provided further information on the revised New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project Environmental Impact Statement to the Office of the Coordinator-General.

The Coordinator-General will use this information, along with feedback from the public, to help inform his decision.

The revised Project would boost current employment from around 300 local jobs to about 435, along with creating a further 260 construction jobs and thousands more indirect jobs.

It will also provide a \$530 million injection into the South East Queensland economy each year and \$8 billion over the life of the mine.

WORK PROGRESSING IN ACLAND

Work is underway around Acland to maintain the township and its facilities as part of the Acland Management Plan for the revised New Acland Coal Mine Stage 3 Project.

Under the revised Project, the Acland town area, including the Tom Doherty Park, War Memorial and Acland No.2 Colliery, will be left in place.

New Hope's Chief Operating Officer Bruce Denney said the company will maintain these properties to ensure their preservation.

"The revised New Acland Project will also ensure that permanent access and utility

services to Acland will be maintained over the life of the Project," he said.

"The first stage of tree planting around the township has already started, featuring tree species that are native to the area and will be easy to maintain.

"Under the revised Project, New Hope will also expand its Lagoon Creek conservation zone to protect trees and koala habitats.

"The revised Project's Acland Colliery Conservation Management Plan outlines steps to preserve the original Acland underground mine pit head and buildings.

"New Hope is continuing to consult with local landowners and community members to achieve the best possible outcomes under the revised Project plan."

The revised Stage 3 Project plan is currently before the Queensland Coordinator-General, with a report and approval decision expected later this year.

The current mine will run out of coal in around two years and so the revised Stage 3 Project is aimed at keeping the mine operating and maintaining local jobs and community benefits.

LOCAL GROUPS BENEFIT FROM COMMUNITY INVESTMENT

The New Hope Group has announced that six local community initiatives will share in more than \$140,000 through the latest round of its New Acland Community Investment Fund (CIF).

With the assistance of the New Acland Community Reference Group (CRG), the CIF was established in 2013 by New Hope as a way of strengthening the company's ongoing commitment to community development on the Darling Downs.

CRG members, who represent a broad cross section of community interests in the area surrounding the New Acland Coal Mine, assessed applications and made recommendations to New Hope on appropriate community initiatives for support.

"This funding round we will support the Goombungee Public Hall with the installation of insulation and lining of the ceiling as part of the hall upgrade project," New Acland General Manager Andrew McDonald said.

"The Goombungee State School P&C will receive funds to upgrade the pool and its facilities, allowing for longer opening hours, fitness and learn to swim programs to operate and a reduction in operating costs.

"The Haden State School P&C will be able to construct a shelter area at the front of the school which can be used by students waiting for buses or to be collected by parents, as well as any other visitors to the school.

"The Maclagan Memorial Hall Association will receive funds to help refresh the hall by painting the building's exterior and replacing the entry steps.

"The Oakey Historical Museum Society will be able to build a new BBQ area

which will be used by visitors to the museum and groups who hire the venue for functions.

"The Toowoomba Clubhouse Association will receive funding to trial and establish a more permanent clubhouse service in Oakey to create a supportive community for those living with mental illness where they can connect with their peers, build confidence and actively participate in the community."
